## CC'S ALL-STAR SCHOLARS GET GOVERNOR ROBERTS' VOTE

**PCC students** Paul Mai, Artangia Presley, Melissa Fern and Diana Weurtz travelled south recently.

**Along with** 15 other community college students from across Oregon, they arrived in Salem in February to be recognized by Gov. Barbara Roberts for academic excellence.

**The event** — the Oregon Community College Academic All-Star Awards — was organized by Oregon Community College Commissioner Dale Parnell who intends to turn the first-time ceremony into an annual event.

**The students**, ranging in age from 19 to 47, are symbolic of community colleges, said the Governor, who noted that they attract students who are just starting and those who are starting over.

**"That's been** the wonder of community colleges. They've been there for everyone," Roberts said. "They meet all kinds of needs for all kinds of people."

**Commissioner Parnell** added, "These 19 are symbolic of the high achievement of many of our students."
